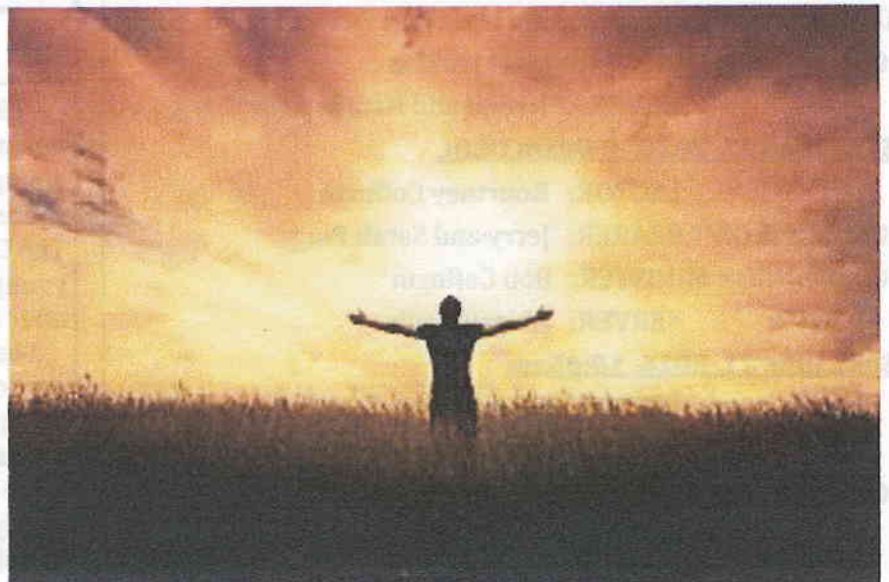

St. Aloysius Gonzaga, Memorial, June 21

Not only did expectations run high for Aloysius being the eldest of eight children, but he was also being greatly prepared and pressured by his parents to be the heir of Castiglione, a Military Prince of the Holy Roman Empire!

Aloysius had other ideas. At the age of seven he declared he wanted to be a saint. He rejected the culture of the courts, and set for himself a devotional pattern of prayer, fasting and self-denial. At twelve, while recovering from kidney failure, he read about the saints, and decided to imitate them. He would rise at midnight to pray, kept his eyes in public cast downward so as not to look at the opposite sex, and even went so far as to strike himself with a dog whip for mortification. At fifteen he decided to join the Jesuits. His father discouraged this, even sending bishops and military leaders to deter him. Aloysius was even sent to a two-year tour of courts and military schools to distract him.

In the end, Aloysius won, and at 17 joined the Jesuits and obtained St. Robert Bellarmine as a spiritual director. Bellarmine helped him form a strong loving heart for God and for others.

While helping his fellow Jesuits care for plague victims, Aloysius himself contracted the disease. He spent much of his remaining days writing his mother with guidance about living a holy life. He died at the young age of 23.

He is the patron saint of young people, people facing death, family life, and countercultural witnessing.

From Father David

I wish I had the persuasive powers to motivate more of you to attend weekday Mass. I know you love the Mass, and participate joyfully in our weekend liturgies, where you are quite faithful in attending, even often sitting in the same pew week after week.

I wonder, then, why weekday Mass doesn't hold more of an appeal for you who are retired or available to participate? You seem available on some weekdays, such as Ash Wednesday, and Holy Days of Obligation, so why not at least occasionally on other "regular" weekdays? We moved the Mass to noon in the hope more folks might be free to attend. At first, some did. But not so much now (although there are days of pleasant fluctuation when more people are in the pews).

While I do give a brief weekday homily, I keep things moving because I know folks have work and other appointments during the week. That is to say, I try to be considerate of folks' scheduling needs, and I want to "keep them coming back."

We have comfortable interior temperatures, with a/c and heat in due season, of course, and just installed new sound components to make the audio experience much better than it was.

Sisters and brothers, no Catholic prayer is more powerful than The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Its ramifications are literally eternal! Both The Liturgy of the Word, and The Liturgy of The Eucharist combine to make an everlasting pleasing and majestic offering to the Father.

While we remember the individual for whom the Mass is formally offered, we can remember at Mass all those in our heart with special needs—especially in our families, and among our friends. What a golden gift!

I gently must ask: Are the distractions keeping some of you away from at-least-an-occasional weekday Mass truly worth the trade you are making? Do those distractions or pleasures possibly compare with the eternal blessings and graces of Holy Mass?

The brief noon liturgies keep us focused on God's Holy Word, and the majesty of his Real Eucharistic Presence! What more do we need?

If you want to give your day sacred balance and proper perspective, please consider joining us during the week. Weekday Mass starts at noon on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, and at 11am on Wednesday, so we can follow-up with an hour of Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction that day. (The only exception: Twice monthly I am away with the Thursday prison Mass, always announced prior in the bulletin.)

This is not the first time I have used this column space to promote weekday Mass attendance. I hope if I "keep at it" maybe some hearts out there will be touched; maybe they might consider making weekday Mass part of their weekly routines! We would so love to have you join us! Please consider it and pray about it. Thank you.



The Shrine Candles

We remind everyone again that the shrine candles in The Cry Room must be lit with the provided long safety lighter, and not by other means, including sulfur matches. (If anyone requires assistance operating the simple provided lighter, please ask for help from an usher.)

In addition, only designated staffers adjust or replenish the candles in any way.

Safety in The Cry Room is paramount. We are sorry, but if the candle policy is not followed, the real-candles will be removed. It only takes one or two uncooperative individual(s) to ruin things for others. (We hope these well-intentioned bulletin notices suffice in handling this Fire Safety issue.)
