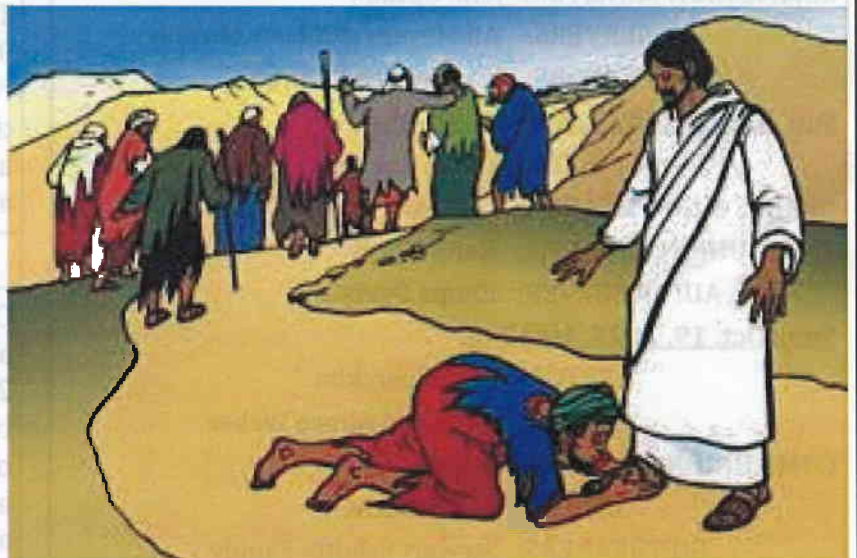

World Mission Month: October

A Call to Hope

Each October, the Church invites us to rediscover our missionary vocation. This year, Pope Leo XIV, following the inspiration of Pope Francis, calls us to become “Missionaries of Hope Among the Peoples,” inspired by St. Paul’s words: “Hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit” (Rom 5:5). In the 50th anniversary year of *Evangelii Nuntiandi*, we are reminded that “modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers” (41). Through prayer, sacrifice, and giving, we too become witnesses—bringing the hope of Christ to those who long for love, justice, and peace. Let us begin this month with open hearts, ready to respond to the Church’s call to support the 1,124 mission territories where the Church is young, growing, and often persecuted. Together, may we be bearers of hope where it is needed most.

United in Prayer with the Missions

As World Mission Month continues, we are invited not only to give but to pray for the Church in mission territories. One powerful way to do this is by praying the World Mission Rosary, introduced by Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen in 1951. Each decade is a different color, representing a region of the world. In *Evangelii Nuntiandi*, St. Pope Paul VI reminds us that prayer is the soul of all mission: “It is the Holy Spirit who, today just as at the beginning of the Church, acts in every evangelizer” (75). Through our prayers, we unite ourselves with missionaries bringing the Gospel to the ends of the earth. Let us offer our rosaries and Masses this week for those who bring Christ’s love to the margins, often at great personal cost. And let us ask the Holy Spirit to rekindle the fire of hope in our own hearts, that we may also be missionaries, wherever we are.

From Fr. David

Sisters and brothers, do you ever feel like I do—that it’s hard to stay on top of all the news, and how to interpret it? With 24/7 newsfeeds and multiple outlets competing for viewers’ time and attention, one story quickly blends into another. We can only retain and process so much until a kind of “overload” ensues. Then soon there is a “new cycle” of fresh stories with spins and editorial angles all their own.

As I watch one of the 5:30pm standard half-hour news broadcasts, I am amazed how very complicated big stories are often reduced to nutshell soundbites before the topic morphs into something altogether different.

There is even a blending of top headlines (war-and-peace, government shutdowns, big-city crime control) with pop-culture lighter news involving things like Taylor Swift releasing a new album. Grouping such crazy-different stories in the same half-hour newscast seems so odd, even jarring.

We have long questioned the attempts at “balance” in our news today, with many people—especially the young—getting their information from podcasts and entertainment venues.

Perceptions and opinions fly as a battle already looms for the 2026 “midterm elections” and attempts at “redistricting” to impact legislative majorities.

As Catholics how do we make sense of it all? Well, for starters, we should consult solid Catholic resources, like our own diocesan newspaper, readily accessible online. This award-winning publication covers an array of topics from a Catholic perspective, and adheres to the teachings of The Sacred Magisterium. Our own Bishop Paprocki is courageous and straight-forward in sharing his own stances and views (in a popular weekly column), even at the cost to him of periodic strong pushback. Other sites, like FORMED, available to our parishes free online, and National Catholic Register and EWTN, help make sense of important news stories impacting our world today.

Friends, as news cycles churn and spin around us, may we always prioritize eternal truths, including the constancy of God’s love and His might. May we, like our Blessed Mother Mary, surrender in trust and faith to His power and loving majesty!

- **Any color:** black, white, and dark gray are common, but any color accepted
- **Any brand:** that you (or your children or grand children) wear daily will be perfect
