From Father David

Sisters and Brothers, Friday is the Solemnity of The Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. While not a Holy Day of Obligation, the day is most hallowed. Please consider Mass that day, or at least special prayers befitting such a Solemnity of our Lord. His heart, depicted with thorns and firey flames, overflows with loving mercy for each one of us, and perhaps even most especially for repentant sinners.

My ordination class of eight was ordained on this special Solemnity in 2020. In those months at the peak of the Covid pandemic, we had participated in a conference call with Bishop Paprocki. Our goal was to pick a day for our priestly ordination amid the hassles and cancellation-delays and reschedulings of that confusing era. After quite a bit of discussion and calendar-consultations, we landed on Friday, June 19. We agreed on that date, only later to discover it fell that year on The Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus!

We were amazed at our good fortune that way, and considered it a special grace and blessing! (Two days later that year was Father's Day, the date of my Mass of Thanksgiving, or First Mass. And who was sitting in the front pew of the Cathedral that morning? --My dear old dad! That sweet memory carries special poignancy this year, as you might imagine.)

In any case, I consider the Solemnity as my ordination anniversary; I always take comfort in this connection of my ordination class with so beautiful a day honoring our Lord.

Ironically, "The Sacred Heart" (as I've mentioned before) has factored into many other steps along my life's way—including a Springfield church very much enjoyed by my family and me in my childhood. Sacred Heart was the name, too, of the Peoria parish where I stayed during my Clinical Pastoral Education, and the name of the Wisconsin seminary where I spent my formation years. The Order of the priests who owned the seminary was "The Priests of the Sacred Heart"! It's amazing how The Spirit works in our lives with these kind of heavenly so-called "coincidences."

Again, friends, please be aware of Friday's great Solemnity overflowing with grace and blessings. Take time to honor this special day, so often seen in conjunction with The Solemnity of the Immaculate Heart of Mary— These two hearts bound in such amazing eternal love, including for us and for our families!

The Seven Gifts of The Holy Spirit

What are the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit? Isaiah tells us that as Jesus was blessed with these gifts by his Father, every believer is blessed with the same gifts by the Holy Spirit.

Wisdom is the first gift of the Holy Spirit. It is the ability to exercise good judgment. It is grounded in common sense and comes from life experience, thoughtful reflection, and learning life's lessons. Wisdom distinguishes between right and wrong, seeks and upholds truth and justice, and balances personal good with the common good.

Understanding is the gift of intelligence and enlightenment. It is the ability to perceive, comprehend, and interpret information; to have insight and discern meaning.

Counsel is good advice. It is the ability to teach and inform, guide and direct, warn and admonish, recommend and encourage. The Holy Spirit offers this special gift to parents, teachers, coaches, mentors, advisors, supervisors, elders, and the like. Counsel is not only the ability to give good advice, but to receive it as well.

Fortitude is an unwavering commitment to God or a proper course of action, and it shows itself in moral strength, courage, determination, patient endurance, spirit, stamina, and resiliency.

Knowledge is the ability to study and learn; to acquire, retain, and master a wide spectrum of information; and to put it to good use for constructive purposes.

Fear of the Lord is awe, reverence, and respect for God. It downplays human self-sufficiency and acknowledges that everything comes from God. Consequently, those who "Fear the Lord" gladly offer their worship to God alone.

Piety is the only gift not part of Isaiah's original list. Piety is personal holiness, the ability to live a decent life, free of sin, devoted to God, and obedient to God's will.
